So there I was; in a bar in Philadelphia with four friends from New York. I recall being upset because I couldn't sit at the bar with my best friend, the bartender.

Bartenders were like that for me....best friends.

Anyway, we were sitting at a table and I ordered a double on ice. When it arrived, I looked at my drink sitting there and I knew it was not going to be enough. It was not going to get me where I needed to be fast enough.

I put my hand up to order another drink. Mind you, I hadn't taken a sip of the first drink. As I raised my right hand to flag down the server, something touched me on my right temple. And in that moment the world stopped. Noise stopped, time stopped and I was in another dimension. In slow motion I turned my head and looked down my arm to my hand clutching that drink. And in that moment, which seemed to last awhile, I suddenly realized that I had become my father (He died at 46 of cirrhosis of the liver). I pushed the drink away in horror. I had, in essence, taken the first half of the first step. Powerless. I got it.

I sat there for awhile, not wanting to drink the drink in front of me. But I knew they would ask why I wasn't drinking. So, I held the glass to my lips pretending to drink. (That was a first!).


As we left the bar, I knew when I said goodbye to my friends, that they would never again see the old me. I was absolutely certain that my life had changed and that I was about to walk a different path.

The next morning I telephoned Philadelphia Intergroup and they sent me to a midday meeting. When I arrived I walked in and sat down without any fear. Clearly something greater than me was at work. When they asked if there were any newcomers I raised my hand and said, "My name is Tom and I am an alcoholic". Never did I think I would utter those words, so important to me today.

As I attended meetings and found a temporary sponsor I began to understand the unmanageability of my life. When I came in I just thought it was about not drinking. While that is true, I slowly came to the realization that my life, when managed by me, was totally unmanageable. I then began to rely on my sponsor to help guide me into a life of sane decisions. I also began to practice living by spiritual principles. I began to develop a relationship with something greater than me that I don't always understand. So I stayed and took suggestions. Today I am 33 years sober and attend meetings regularly. I hope, if you're reading this, that you come to AA and catch this thing called alcoholism. Because I've seen people come in here ..... not catch alcoholism.... and go out and die from it.

# NOVEMBER 1969 First Tradition Checklist BY: B. L. MANHATTAN, NEW YORK

#### **First Tradition Checklist**

My sobriety depends on unity with you.

What am I doing to help build that unity?

Here are some questions I ask myself when I take my First

Tradition inventory:

- 1. Am I in my group a healing, mending, integrating person, or am I divisive? What about gossip and taking other members' inventories?
- 2. Am I a peacemaker? Or do I, with pious preludes such as "just for the sake of discussion," plunge into arguments?
- 3. Am I gentle with alcoholics who rub me the wrong way, or am I abrasive?
- 4. Do I make competitive AA remarks, such as comparing one group with another or contrasting AA in one place with AA in another?
- 5. Do I put down some AA activities as if I were superior for not participating in this or that aspect of AA?
- 6. Am I informed about AA as a whole? Do I support, in every way I can, AA as a whole or just the parts I understand and approve of?
- 7. Am I as considerate of AA members as I want them to be of me?
- 8. Do I spout platitudes about love while indulging in and secretly justifying behavior that bristles with hostility?
- 9. Do I go to enough AA meetings or read enough AA literature to really keep in touch?
- 10. Do I share with AA all of me, the bad and the good, accepting as well as giving the help of fellowship?

"AA's Twelve Traditions have, in my experience, often proved vital in keeping me sober, and helpful otherwise in all my affairs." This is the first of a series of articles sharing that experience.

Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends on AA unity.

MY AA HISTORY consists of two extended slips during an otherwise sober quarter-century. I have not taken or wanted a drink since May 1952, but I have learned much about alcohol and AA, and a little about myself. For instance, I no longer have quick, simple answers for staying sober, although at times I sound as if I had. For example, I have said I had sobriety of the head, not sobriety of the heart, in my first year, and I've been so proud of this eloquence that I was deaf to the vanity revealed: the implication that my own superior ability at rational thinking kept me from drinking. More honest thinking suggests that what kept me sober those first days was not any of my doing at all. Obviously, it was not rules or laws, either, since we have none. In fact, our Twelve Traditions had not even been written yet, the first year I spent dry, sitting around in New York City's old 41st Street clubhouse, glum and stiff in one of the musty pews of that barnlike old church building where meetings were held.

I made a few mechanical gestures that year, doing my turn at desk or telephone duty, reading the AA publications (very few then), and speaking at meetings. I even typed copy for the early, tabloid-size Grapevine. But none of this was based on any real desire to change myself.

This beautiful we, this sticking together in our brotherhood of love--which can heal my individual sick soul, as well as cementing together our Fellowship--is set forth for all of us in the words "Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon AA unity."

## Do you have a homegroup? Where and when does it meet? Why is this important to you or not?

I have 2 home groups because I have two homes. So my first home group is in Las Vegas, Nevada. It's Common Solution which meets at the meeting space four times a week. My second home group is Panguitch Lake meeting. Keep The Corky in The Bottle and it meets every Saturday at Panguitch Lake, Utah. A home group is important to me because it holds me accountable. I need to show up, get commitments, and then people notice if I'm not there. They check on me and you know make sure that I'm okay. So it gives you a support group inside of a support group like AA is a huge support group. My home group is a support group inside of a support group.

#### Do you have a sponsor? Tell us the best and/or worst thing they ever told you.

Yes, Leslie R. She has been my sponsor for 11 years now. The worst thing that she has told me is about myself and the best thing that she has ever told me is about myself.



#### Tell us something about your experience sponsoring others?

I have had generally across the board I have had really amazing good experiences. I don't have bad experiences. Because I am upfront and I let my sponsee's know that if theres something better for them or someone better for them, that's what they need to do. Their sobriety is much more important than my ego and I remain friends with all of the people I've ever sponsored. Which is important to me because again it's a support group. But the best part of sponsoring is watching the sponsee's come back to life, finding hope again, and then finding a new way of life and then forward and forward and bigger and bigger. There's nothing to replace watching that.



#### **Favorite service position?**

Chip chick because you get to celebrate with that person every month and year. These are huge things for them. Right? Another day of sobriety is huge! Another month of sobriety is huge. Another year of sobriety is huge in our world. Right? It's like okay, I did it! I did it one more time. I did it one more time and being able to hand that person that chip and their excitement is the best. It's the best.

#### Most important lesson learned in sobriety?

Not everyone has your best interest, but not everybody works the same program of recovery that you work. Right? Some people are still very much out for themselves and will take advantage of you. Being so naïve about thins so that my biggest lesson.

#### Favorite line or reading from the big book? Why?

My absolute favorite line in the big book is in the reading on acceptance on page 417. It says nothing absolutely nothing happens in God's world by mistake. Right that and because that reminds me that all my good and all my bad are for a reason. God's got a plan for me. I just have to hang onto it and have faith. It's a good plan.

#### Best piece of advice from an old timer?

Get in the middle of the herd. Come all the way in and sit all the way down.

#### Best and/or worst thing heard at a meeting?

You hear a lot of good things and you hear a lot of bad things I think. The worst I hear is when people put AA in absolutes. You have to do this or you have to do that. Because each person as an individual there's no have to. It's find what works for you. It's very fluid program. What works for me is not necessarily going to work for the next person so there's no have to. It's a find what works best for you and so when I hear people say you have to do something it's really just cringe to me.

#### Which step do you find yourself coming back to regularly? Why?

6 & 7 because those character defects are like a little whack a moll game. Just when I think one is gone it pops back up again.

#### Which tradition means the most to you?

Tradition 5 each group has one primary purpose to carry the message to the alcoholic who still stuffers.

#### Best advice to a newcomer?

Get in the middle of the herd. Come all the way in and sit all the way done.

In keeping with the Seventh Tradition, Las Vegas Intergroup of Alcoholics Anonymous (LVIAA) limits contributions to two sources: A.A. groups, and individual A.A. members.

We ask that group treasurers include Group Name (as it appears in the meeting schedule) and District for contributions to the Central Office so we can maintain our records properly.

While there is no limitation on the amount an A.A. group may contribute to LVIAA, in keeping with the Seventh Tradition, individual A.A. members may not give more than seventy five hudred dollars (\$7,500.) per year to LVIAA.

#### THE LATEST FROM BOARD OF DIRECTORS TREASURER



Our 2024 budget forecasted a \$4,045 operating loss. The financials will show an operating loss of \$3,087. However, we did not budget for the \$3,397 spent for consulting fees. These fees were the second and final payment for our ERC applications, originally submitted in 2023, which resulted in the \$53,709 received and entered as other income. So, all around, financially, we did well. Without the consulting fees factored in, I would state that we had a \$310 operating profit We thank our members and groups for their monthly contributions. We thank those groups and districts who use our meeting room.

In line with our guidelines, the Board continues to make strides towards our prudent reserve goals. We are in the process of moving most of the ERC monies into CDs allocated as Prudent Reserves. Also, we've moved \$10,000 from our Literature account into a 3-month CD to take advantage of the interest rates.

Eileen and I are in the process of improving our data entry procedures, which will result in greater accuracy and also create a new and improved financial statement. You may have noticed different account names with the intent to make them more self-explanatory, while some accounts have been combined for simplicity's sake, because they contained the same type of data. I can assure you that these changes are for the statements to better accurately report our financial data to you.

At next week's Board meeting, we'll be submitting a balanced 2025 budget for the Board's consideration. Thank you.






#### **BOARD OF DIRECTORS**
